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DRY CONDITIONS CONTINUE, MANDATORY BURN BAN EXTENDED

MARION COUNTY, Fla. (June 14, 2011) – Due to dry conditions, the Marion County Multi-Agency Wildland Task Force recommended to extend the mandatory burn ban for Marion County today. Marion County Board of County Commissioners Chairman Stan McClain approved and signed the original emergency order on May 31.

The burn ban prohibits campfires and all open burning, excluding attended and monitored barbeque and cooking equipment. The burn ban also prohibits the use, ignition or discharge of any type of explosive compounds, fireworks, flares or sparklers. If citizens are caught violating the burn ban, they could face fines and other consequences. However, commercial burners may still be eligible for a burn permit on a case by case basis pending onsite inspections from the Florida Division of Forestry and/or Marion County Fire Rescue. The average drought index, based on a scale from 0 to 800, is currently 643 in Marion County. Any number above 500 is considered a wildfire danger zone. The drought index coupled with lack of rainfall, dry weather, low humidity and gusting wind prompted the task force to take action. As an alternative to outdoor burning, Marion County residents may take up to two cubic yards of debris (leaves, scrub clippings and small branches) to the Marion County landfill or recycling centers for free.

Meanwhile, firefighters urge citizens to follow these safety tips:

- Delay outside burning until the mandatory burn ban is lifted.
- Take yard debris to Marion County’s landfill or recycling centers, a safer alternative to backyard burning. Citizens should call 352-671-8465 for more information.
- Immediately report arson or other suspicious activity to law enforcement.
- Use vehicle ashtrays; don’t throw cigarette butts out the window.
- Use caution when mowing or working with other equipment that could spark.
- If you spot a fire or large column of smoke, call 911.

The Marion County Multi-Agency Wildland Task Force formed shortly before the unprecedented 1998 wildfire season. Over the last decade, firefighters and other public safety professionals from local city, county, state and federal agencies have met on a routine basis to discuss wildfire conditions, call load, manpower capabilities, wildfire tactics and public education campaigns. The Wildland Task Force makes recommendations, to the Marion County Board of County Commissioners to implement mandatory burn bans based on participating agencies’ feedback.

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
